




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Windows


I prefer to start a model with a job I think is going to be difficult, in this case, the windows. They have to be done right or the model won't look right. If I can get them right, I can build the rest. I am sure I am not the only one who can't make a nice rectangular hole, much less a lot of them. This is the way I did it, but I know there are different ways to go about it.

I start by drafting the superstructure sides on a sheet of styrene. The edges of the styrene are parallel to the waterline, and the top and bottom of the side and a window reference line are measured and drawn.

The windows were vertical (because the carpenters used levels) and they will all be the same height above the deck (the reference line I drew) following the shear. I measured the window spacing along the edge (waterline) and used a drafting triangle to mark the a vertical line for each window.



- 1. I drilled a small hole at the intersection of the vertical and reference line to make the corner easy to find. Note the "X" which will confirm the template is on the right side of the line
- 2. I made a brass template the size of the window openings to I could draw each window the same size using a triangle to keep the vertical register
- 3. A sheet metal step drill was used to quickly remove most of the material from the window
- 4. A sheet metal nibbler was used to remove the rest of the material and to make the corners
- 5. I used a hobby knife and files to tune the window openings so the Grandt Line windows fit the hole properly.



Making the windows wasn't as bad as I thought it would be. More then half the windows are made and the rest will wait until the deck is in place so I an follow the same procedure for camber. My only regret is that I didn't visit the Langford Tech Cave sooner. I didn't know they were doing 3D printing and I would have happily commissioned windows from them rather than use the Grandt Line windows. Grandt Line has an excellent product and gives good service, but I prefer to support the local guys.
