#### SOME WAY TO ORGANIZE A SHIPWRECK. (Henk Meursing)

When visiting Virginia in September last, we heard an interesting explanation for the name of NAG's HEAD, at the Atlantic Coast. Nag's narrow peninsula, jutting out and paralleling North Carolina's northern coast.

In olden times, the beach-looters (beachcombers) waited for dark, stormy nights. They took their horses (nags), tied a strap around their necks and attached a lattern. They then walked the horse quietly over the dunes, so that the movement of the

horses gave an impression of the light of a ship, that rode the swells. Merchantmen at sea thought it was safe to sail where they saw the lights of other ships (!) bobbing on the waves, they hit the shallow coasts, wrecked were plundered.

#### SAILING RULES.

In order to be fair to other sailors and to avoid situations that could result in a collision with another boat, causing damage, some basic sailing right-of-way rules should be observed.

The fundamental rule is that a sailboat starboard tack has the right-of-way over a boat on port tack. This means the wind is coming over the starboard (right) side of wind is coming over Head is situated on a the boat and the sail is swung out on the port (left) side.

> A boat to windward shall keep clear of a leeward boat, and an overtaking boat must generally keep clear.
