
Maritime Museum gets catalogue aid

The provincial Archives Assistance Program has given \$8,500 to the Maritime Museum of B.C. to catalogue thousands of ships' plans donated by one of B.C.'s oldest shipyards.

Versatile Pacific, formerly Yarrows, gave the museum more than 20,000 plans of ships built and repaired at the yards since the start of this century.

The plans give the museum one of the most complete collections in North America.

However, extra staff had to be hired to sort through the plans to put them in order and list what is available for researchers and model builders.



The provincial grant program will pay half the cost of an archives project up to \$10,000 limit to make records available to the public.

THE ANCIENT PILOT

The art of piloting a ship is an ancient skill. In the Old Testament we read "Thy wise men, O tyre were thy pilots". The dictionary defines a Pilot as "one who steers ships along a coast, or into or out of a harbour where navigation is dangerous". From time immemorial local men have offered their services to guide ships through safe channels into harbour. Many men depended on this for their livelihood, and in the early days their lives depended upon their efficiency. It is even recorded in an ancient document that in the event of a pilot's carelessness leading a ship into danger, mariners were at liberty to behead him without answering to a court of law. Rather a severe form of disciplinary action!

The pilots worked as individuals or in small groups from sailing cutters in which they patrolled off the approaches to a port. With them worked apprentices, whose job it was to row them across to vessels calling for their services, and to pick them up from outgoing ships. The sailing cutters had two very sea worthy craft, and often had to be sailed singlehanded - features which made yachtsmen keen to buy them when they came up for sale.

The pilots had to buy their own craft and run them themselves on the fees received, the scales for which were laid down in the local dock regulations. In the British Isles there are some 120 pilotage districts, each with its own system over which the Board of Trade assumed control by Act of Parliament in 1913, thus bringing to an end the individual activities of the pilots.




Library Report

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
