





Win or loose, the purpose of it all is to have a brake from the daily grind.



SIMPLE HOMEMADE LADDERS

This is a straight forward way of making ladders cheaply, out of a common household item called thread! Yes, who would have guessed, of all things, using thread for something other than rigging! Now I know I have probably written a few too may exams and had too much egg nog, but I gave this unlikely technique a try over the holidays and I found the results appeared to be reasonable.

The materials required to produce a ladder include the following, a four sided wood frame, scotch tape, thread, Zap Gap Glue (or any other cyanoacrylate cement), Scotch Tape, and a sharp pair of scissors.



To begin you must assemble the wood frame with appropriate dimensions, obviously the frame should be larger ,and taller than the desired ladder and wide enough so that more than one ladder may be produced at the same time. On the long sides of the frame mark off the spacing for the ladder steps. Then on the short sides mark off the upright rails. If care is taken to do this accurately you will soon be producing flawless ladders. It is a good idea to cover you marks with a base layer of scotch tape to prevent your precisely measured marks from wear.


Now you are ready to manufacture your first set of ladders. Begin by choosing thread that does not have a lot of fuzz on it. I used a fairly heavy grade of polyester/cotton thread. A waxed thread may also work. Basically, to produce a ladder you tape pieces of thread across the corresponding marks begining with the upright rails. Then finnish tapingthe steps in place. One important time-saving hint , to mention here, is to fold a portion of each piece of tape over before applying it to the frame, this will allow for easy removal of the tape after the ladder is complete. Once the taping is completed the only thing left to do is coat the ladder in Zap-Gap glue. After waiting for a few hours the ladder will be ready to cut free.

I used this technique to make ladders in 1:96 scale. It is possible that with a heavier thread larger scale ladders could be produced. This method could also be adapted to produce grating, warship radar antennae, and other small delicate structures.
