The C.P.R. Princess boats are legendary on our coast and played an important part of our history and development. Many of us are not aware that the southern interior of B.C. was also served by a large fleet of C.P.R. steam driven vessels. The inland service was an extension of C.P. Mainline and Kettle Valley Railways. The service concentrated on Okanagan, Kootenay and Arrow lakes and communities surrounding each of these waterways. A smaller service was also operated on Slocan Lake as well.

On each of the large lakes, C.P.R. ran shipyards and extensive maintenance facilities to keep the passenger, freight and rail barge vessels performing thier duties. The sternwheelers were the largest in the fleet with lengths up to 200 ft., the tugs that serviced the railbarges ranged from 65' to 110' and were kept very busy as the barge system was a vital link in the success of the railways.

Featured here is the "COLUMBIA", a hybrid vessel that became known as a passenger tug. These vessels were very versatile as they were used for every conceivable type of cargo, as well as a passenger service.


The "COLUMBIA" was built in 1920 at Nakusp on Arrow Lake, at the C.P.R. Shipyard for a cost of \$26,500. She cruised at 11 MPH and could accommodate 34 passengers in her lounge. She also had aboard a small galley and food service area.

The "COLUMBIA" saw extensive winter use, as she was an ideal size with there wasn't enough traffic for the larger sternwheelers. She was sold in 1948 after 27 years of service on the Columbia River - Arrow Lakes Service.

The plans shown here where drawn by Robert Turner and with his permission were duplicated from his book "Sternwheelers and Steam Tugs". He is sorry that unfortunately there are no patterns available for the frame sections, so some design substitution would be necessary. She is an all wood hull, 80 feet in length with a beam of 15.4 feet and a draft of 8.4 feet. Based on a scale of half inch to the foot, she would make a worthwhile RC project. For other building ideas and interesting reading, Robert D. Turner of Victoria has written quite a few informative books on our B.C. marine history. A special thanks to Bob Turner for allowing us to duplicate the "Columbia" from his book.

THE MAKING OF A STAR PART IV

To begin part four, a word of warning!! I mentioned in a previous article that when building my

rudder I used 1/8th inch brass rod that I had in my workshop. It was at a latter date that I was to discover my error. On arrival at Beaver Lake, ready to have a good sail, I slipped whilst carrying my boat down to the water. On testing out the radio prior to launching the boat I discovered to my disgust that my rudder was not present. A search was made of the area between the water and my car. There I discovered the rudder. The brass rod had broken and the rudder was rendered useless. This of course resulted in the making and fitting of a completely new rudder. Fortunately, Ben Rusi was able to provide me with a 5/16th inch length of Titanium

rod, a much stronger substitute for my new rudder shaft. I would recommend using this as it is so much stiffer than brass.

In the last part I mentioned that no is a od time to fit your R/C receiver and servos. I suggested mounting these on a removable board. The reason for this was that if one uses the same receiver for more that one boat, the transfer from one boat to the other is much easier. This board can be held in position using the versatile "Velcro" patches, as can your servos, etc.

The next item to fit is the deck. This was

simply made using the remaining "door-skin" stock. It had a very pleasing grain pattern so I framed out the areas needed as hatches, cut the ply to fit, glued it, and gave it a coat of varnish to seal the grain. When dry the various deck fittings were located and fitted in place. A suit of sails had been previously ordered through Ben Rusi. I could of coarse have attempted to produce a set of cloth sails, but why re-invent the wheel when at reasonable cost a professionally made suit of sails was available? While waiting for my sails to arrive I made up my mast, boom, and jib club in accordance with the instructions provided. On receipt of my sails, I was able to rig the boat using the data from the instruction booklet. Having ensured that everything conformed to specifications, I removed all rigging and spars and completed the finish coats of paint, varnish, and the application of decals.

Then came the long awaited day when I could launch my STAR 45. I was anxious to see how she floated. Would she float level or would she be nose heavy? I had heard that STAR's have a tendency to dig the nose in so I was concerned. With this in mind and not wishing to embarrass myself, I decided to have a sneak preview. I launched my STAR at Beaver lake on a weekday hoping that I wouldn't be observed. In this I seem to have been successful and the boat did not let me down. I attribute this to the easily understood set of instructions and drawings provided by Ben Rusi and the enthusiastic help and encouragement of both Ken Lockley and his charming wife Lois.

In conclusion I would like to say that the "STAR 45" is an excellent craft, and when my sailing skills improve to the standards that are displayed every other Sunday at the lake. I hope to able to give as good a show with "Sandgroper". So come on all you budding yachting enthusiasts. Take yourself a Star, a STAR 45 that is.
