

We would like to thank these people for wanting to include VMSS in these important public events and we sincerely look forward to joining you all again next year.







THE SUB SUBJECT

Burdened by June's promise, state-of-the-art model submarines and those models' sub-systems are up for some tight (Read: "skimpy") review right now.

"State of the Art," of course, is a moveable feast. While this column winds through the writing/publishing stage, some sub modeler, somewhere, will be stretching the envelope, and concoct something newer than new. So be it. Forecasts are the meteorologists' domain, and "Forecasts," according to the ancient Chinese saying, "are very difficult—especially if they deal with the future." As such, recent history, deprived as it may be of a future, is all that can be reported for now.

Voracious consumers of ingenuity, patience and talent are bow planes that fold up or retract and then, while extended, will swivel on their axis. Either one of the two is not that tough to achieve, but combined they raise the bar considerably—even more so if JUST ONE SERVO is given both tasks. But it can be done. It has been done. Where neither plans nor sketches are available, experiment with mock-ups fashioned out of scrap box contents and coat hanger wire. Total, industrial-strength fun is guaranteed. And (almost) the same goes for a radar mast that extends, spins its antenna/dish, and then retracts into the gopher hole.

Over the course of attending model sub regattas, close examination of two of one David Santivanez's models fried my eyeballs and brains(?) — in that order. At the time, David lived near Seattle—since moved to Sacramento. He built a U.S.S.R. <u>Alfa</u> and a back-breaking <u>Typhoon</u>—also out of the grab bag of Pres. Reagan's "Evil Empire." Both models feature high-pressure, pump-operated ballast systems with multiple air storage tanks, so that submerged trim is maintained. In addition, the boats' bow planes are as agile as one-armed paper hangers. In addition, scopes, snork masts and a gaggle of et ceteras are alive. Also, David's <u>Typhoon</u> has electrically-activated, waterproofed Estes missiles in her VLS (Vertical Launch System) tubes. Torps and an underwater, bow-mounted camcorder were in the works. And how does it all operate?

Not unlike our local boats, David's models are radio & servo equipped. From there on, though, everything has hydraulic circuitry. Looks like a plumber's nightmare but, hey, it all works, & <u>Typhoon</u> has been down 60 ft...

David, no doubt, is ingenious. While he lived near Issaquah, however, he also had the good fortune of friendship with a U.S.A.F. type at McChord A.F. Base who supplied him all sorts of surplus doo-hickies. Add to that the near-by Boeing surplus store, and he had it made. Still, an elegant tip of the hatlo for imaginative use of "useless" items is well earned and deserved.

At one meeting, David admitted to a potentially serious error. Came one spring, and all the yardage of silicone tubing had swollen to a near-bursting size. He'd used an incompatible fluid, but remedied it all before losing a boat, and before getting the E.P.A. on his case for water pollution.

A second stab at acknowledging high-tech model building goes toward a U.K. hobbyist who's name and details of achievement went A.W.O.L. in my stacks of literature.

That gent built a <u>+</u> 1:10 model of a British, WW II X— Craft. No big deal, but wait till you read how he configured the model's electro-mechanical guts.

For surface running and battery charging, the model had a one-lunger diesel. Surfaced, that pushed the vessel along right nicely. Upon submergence radio commands, the diesel stopped, the exhaust sealed, the ballast tank flooded, and the electric motor-generator came on duty. Photos of the internals showed nary a space between the installations. It looked as if she'd float like a cannon ball. And yet, she had a lead keel. That's H2O for juh.

CON'T ...

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A highlight in the model's description (written by a buddy of the builder) was the incorporation of magnetic clutches (out of a Rank-Xerox copier) to shift from diesel to electric drive, or battery charging. Ain't THAT sompin'? In the article: not a word about the R/C system. But at a good guess, channel expanders to expand channel expanders must have entered the picture.

The sadder than sad news out of the article's epilogue was that, either upon the first or second trial run in a lake, the model exploded and sank. Only a puff of smoke marked the spot of the mishap.

According to the eye-witness writer, the modeler took the event in stride, and vowed to "have another go." Later, the guessing went that the gel cell's fumes were ignited by either the heat or a spark from the diesel. But isn't this reported venture worthy of a standing ovation?

For the August "Sub Subject," suggestions regarding model submarine TX layouts will be offered; come fall, the October 1998 "Linkages" topic is to be revisited.

The City of Richmond International Model Ship Competition and Display, sponsored by the City of Richmond, Richmond Rotary Clubs, the Vancouver Maritime Museum, and NorthernStarMall.com will take place at the beautiful Richmond City Hall on the outskirts of Vancouver BC.

There will be prizes awarded in ALL major categories, including kit built models too. Those who do not wish to enter the competition can enter their models for "display only" will have the satisfaction of joining dozens of Modelers from Clubs all over the Pacific Northwest to show their work to an appreciative international audience estimated as high as 20,000.

It also provides members with an ideal opportunity to view the 20 Tall Ships which will be arriving at the historic harbour at Steveston, 10 minutes from the Model Ship Display. Full security and transportation is being offered for models from Vancouver Island and two VMSS executive members will be accompanying them to and from Richmond to make sure no damage occurs.

With over 100 models already registered, the VMSS has been asked to contribute 40 models and we would appreciate a high level of support from all our Members so that our Club has a high profile of participation in this important celebration of model ship building. This is anticipated to be the largest Model Ship Display to have ever taken place in the Pacific NorthWest.

HOW TO STORE YOUR MODELS?

Joop Clobus used to hang his Ben Latham from the ceiling on two very fine stainless steel wires. He would come in from sailing her on the local pond and then hang the vessel buy a small eye on the back of the hounds. To augment his little display he had made a couple of leaping dolphins and suspended these on the waterline. A small low voltage ceiling downlighter highlighted the ship which I think he made at 1:24 scale or ½" to the foot. It all looked very effective.

One further added advantage hanging the ship from the ceiling was that neither of his cats could get at it and every vessel he made was displayed in this manner.

PROFILE:




